Child Abuse Prevention Month: The Caregivers' Role

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, an important time to reflect on the impact we have on the lives of the children in our care. Every member of a community can play a part in preventing child abuse, but the role of the Early Childhood Educator is one of the most significant. This is not only due to the many hours children spend with their teachers, but also because early childhood educators are often the first to notice signs of abuse or neglect. We can play our part to prevent abuse because we have opportunities to shape the lives of children, make meaningful connections with families and help to find and provide them with support when needed.

The Grow NJ Kids process can strengthen these opportunities by assisting in policy development, staff training, collaborative support, and with tools like Strengthening Families.



In 2013 there were 94,486 cases of reported abuse to children in New Jersey¹. There are risk factors for this type of maltreatment, but research shows there are also protective factors that may guard against the dangers of abuse and neglect. As providers of early childhood education, we have important and serious work to do and we are able, through

GNJK, to learn about and to implement the Strengthening Families framework and self-assessment. The Strengthening Families Approach uses research-based strategies to reduce child abuse and neglect by building on five Protective Factors. (See right.)

5 PROTECTIVE FACTORS

Parental Resilience - The ability to bounce back, find ways to solve problems, build and sustain trusting relationships, and find help when needed

Social Connections - Friends, family, neighbors and community members who provide emotional support, help solve problems, offer parenting advice and give assistance

Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development -Accurate information about child development and appropriate expectations which help parents see their children in a positive light and promote their healthy development

Concrete Support in Times of Need - Basic economic needs like food, shelter, clothing and health care, essentials for families when they encounter a crisis such as domestic violence, mental illness or substance abuse

Social and Emotional Competence of Children - A child's ability to interact positively with others, self-regulate their behavior, and effectively communicate their feelings. Challenging behaviors create extra stress for families, so early identification and assistance can prevent negative results and keep development on track.

A Look at GNJK Category 3: Family and Community Engagement

Question from Center:

"There are so many ways we engage families at our center. Why do we need to use Strengthening Families?"

Answer from TAC:

Q & A

Sending photos of children home, inviting family members into the classroom, and providing events for parents to attend can do so much for your school. You may feel very satisfied that you have active parents and that you know what their needs are. However, many families may have needs that we cannot recognize through these activities. We might never realize we are missing what these families need most.

Strengthening Families is a research based framework with tools designed to help:

- ◊ build relationships with families
- ♦ identify the strengths they possess
- ♦ build on these strengths
- \diamond $\;$ recognize the activities you are doing that have the most impact
- ◊ provide skills and techniques for addressing challenging behaviors
- \diamond $\;$ decrease unrealistic expectations that result in frustration and anger
- incite feelings of contentment and connection instead of uncertainty and isolation

The result of Strengthening Families is an improved quality of life, with a decrease in the likelihood of child abuse and neglect.

This process is going to help us improve the quality of our program. I especially like the initiative for professional development. Employees can pursue their CDA or degree through a scholarship. This is a great benefit for our employees."

The staff at Little Treasures involves families by inviting them into classrooms and holding events such as their recent Read Across America Read-a-thon where each child received a new book to take home. They are beginning work with the Strengthening Families framework.
