Program Goals

- To encourage educational acheivement and career planning for the participant.
- To improve parenting skills and knowledge of child development.
- To promote healthy interpersonal relationships and healthy family functioning.
- To delay a subsequent pregnancy until after the participant has graduated from high school.
- To promote the optimal health and development of participants and children.



Background

In 1980, Prevent Child Abuse New Jersey (PCA-NJ) created the Parent Linking Program (PLP), known then as the Parent Linking Project, in response to a local and national concern about the pervasive and enduring social, economic and educational consequences of teenage pregnancy. The project was launched in several local high schools within the state of New Jersey. Several years later, PCA-NJ came to realize that the lack of affordable child care was a major barrier in preventing students from completing their high school education. As a result, PLP's services were expanded in 1984 to include child care, parenting education and life skills workshops. Today, there are nine Parent Linking Programs providing comprehensive Services in nine high schools in the state of New Jersey.

Teen parents are at a greater risk of socioeconomic disadvantage throughout their lives than those who delay childbearing until their twenties. The Parent Linking Program supports expectant and parenting adolescents in an effort to prevent present and future child abuse and neglect. The program's goal is to support the teenage parent's self-esteem and knowledge of parenting and child development by encouraging the teen parent to complete high school and delay repeat pregnancies. Any expectant or parenting teen who attends a sponsoring high school is eligible to participate in the program.

Services Provided

Child Care (most sites)

Located in the high school or at a community based child care center within 1 mile of the school. Sites that do not provide child care connect students to child care services.

Transportation (most sites)

Participants who utilize PLP child care may also qualify for free transportation to and from school.

Individual Sessions

Monthly individual sessions assist expectant and parenting teens with meeting their parenting, educational and personal goals and challenges.

Group Sessions

Weekly group sessions provide information about child development, parenting, positive parent-child interaction, life skills and intimate partner violence while allowing participants to gain support from their peers.

Home Visits

Each teen receives a home visit where case managers engage and observe the student in his/her home environment with an effort to build a stronger relationship with the student and his/her parent(s)/guardian.

Annual Teen Conference

Participants may opt to attend a day of teen empowerment filled with educational workshops and opportunities to meet other teen parents from across the state. Scholarships and raffles prizes are provided.

Incentives, Incentives, Incentives!

Participants who attend regular services are offered incentives for school attendence, good grades and participation in various activities. Incentive programs vary from high school to high school.
