Working With PARENTS

ESSEX PREGNANCY AND PARENTING CONNECTION (EPPC):

We link expectant and new parents in Essex County to a range of supportive services, including home visiting.

PARENT LINKING PROGRAM (PLP):

We provide adolescent parents at 8 schools with the support needed in order for them to graduate high school and strengthen their parenting skills.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION:

We teach parents about positive parenting, and we educate professionals about how to support parents in raising healthy children.

PERIOD OF PURPLE' CRYING:

We prevent Shaken Baby Syndrome (Abusive Head Trauma) with the Period of PURPLE® Crying Program in 15 NJ hospitals, reaching more than 40,000 families annually.

PARENTS AS TEACHERS (PAT):

This national home visiting program builds strong communities, thriving families, and children who are healthy, safe and ready to learn.

HEALTHY FAMILIES AMERICA (HFA):

This national home visiting program promotes child well-being and prevents abuse and neglect of children through family-focused and empathic support provided in the home.

Our evidence-based home visiting programs are the most effective strategy known to prevent child abuse and improve a broad array of child health and development outcomes. Healthy Families America and Parents as Teachers are in all 21 NJ counties. We also support PAT affiliates throughout Maryland, New York, Vermont and Washington, DC.









HOME VISITING

3,320 families were served via 42 program sites supported by PCA-NJ.

67% of families were enrolled for at least one year.

92% of primary caregivers were screened for intimate partner violence.

97% of primary caregivers were screened for depression.

90% of birthing parents attended their 6-8 week postpartum visit.

87% of families initiated breastfeeding with their newborn.

PARENT LINKING PROGRAM (PLP)

98% of our students in grades 9-11 were promoted to the next grade level. 84% of our seniors graduated.

461 group sessions were held for adolescent parents to learn about child development, parenting, healthy relationships, and life skills.

55 students representing 7 high schools attended our annual conference in May.

97% of adolescent parents did not have another pregnancy while in high school after joining PLP.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

1,851 families were provided with evidence-based information on child abuse prevention topics including shaken baby syndrome, child sexual abuse, human trafficking and more.

ESSEX PREGNANCY & PARENTING CONNECTION (EPPC)

EPPC received referrals from 18 of the 22 Essex County municipalities.

88% of referrals were for pregnant women/expectant families with 26% of referrals for first-time parents.

3,400+ families were formally referred with additional referrals received via informal links, social media and texting - a 40% increase from 2022.

80 new parents and new community partners were reached through Community Advisory Board meetings.

60 families were reached through the Annual Parenting Palooza via Zoom. Participants received gift cards to support their parenting, sponsored by Horizon, and attended educational workshops on topics such as: breastfeeding, childbirth education, healthy food preparation, family activity, doula care, communication, the 4th trimester, discipline, and meditation.

CHILD WELLNESS INSTITUTE

ChildWIN® provided trauma-informed trainings to parents and caregivers of Middlesex County Vocational High School students. 36 families attended the trainings and learned how adverse childhood experiences could negatively affect a child's life outcome. They were also taught how to help their children build resilience.

Working With YOUTH

GROW NJ KIDS:

Our Technical Assistance Specialists coach and mentor early childhood education professionals in 7 counties as they work to improve the quality of their infant/toddler, preschool and family childcare programs. The Grow NJ Kids quality rating and improvement system will help parents to make more informed decisions about their child's education.

PEACEFUL PRACTICES:

Via our Child Wellness Institute, we teach students techniques to help them self-regulate.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION:

We educate girls and boys about the dangers of commercial sexual exploitation.

GROW NJ KIDS

Services were provided to:

211 childcare centers

91 Department of Education preschool sites

30 family childcare providers

11 Head Start programs

HOME VISITING

2,934 children were served by 42 sites.

82% of children are up to date with immunizations, compared to the statewide average of 69%.

98% of children have a primary care provider.

97% of children have health insurance.

CHILD WELLNESS INSTITUTE

More than 1,000 elementary students from West New York learned self-regulation through our Peaceful Practices workshops. Students learned breathing exercises, relaxation techniques, and mindfulness activities to help energize and calm their brains and bodies.

PLP

95% of children have a primary care provider.

60% of babies and toddlers utilized PLP day care.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

2,276 purple caps were distributed to newborns throughout 15 hospitals across NJ to raise awareness of the Period of PURPLE® Crying and Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS) and ultimately prevent SBS and infant death.

Working With PROFESSIONALS

CHILD WELLNESS INSTITUTE

We reached over **3,400** professionals – teachers, administrators, social workers and others.

We offered Act 48 approved trauma-informed courses to 100+ educators via our partnership with Penn State Abington.

PLP

100% of PLP staff surveyed agreed they have a positive relationship with PCA-NJ personnel.

CONNECTIONS MATTER

23 professionals representing 15 NJ organizations were trained to be facilitators.

We now have **100+** facilitators from 36 organizations.

96% of participants rated the quality of the Connections Matter training high or very high.

93% of participants found the Connections Matter training useful to their work with children and families.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

519 professionals were trained on the prevention of child abuse and neglect.

YOUNG PARENT COALITION

We launched this Coalition to increase access to evidence-based programs for teen parents and to improve coordination of services for teen parents during and beyond high school graduation.

We held 6 meetings uniting 128 partners statewide to collaborate on service delivery to adolescent parents.

GROW NJ KIDS

We educated **10,071** early childhood professionals on Developmentally Appropriate Practices, Home Visiting & Communicating with Families.

The Mandated Reporter training was delivered to 1,396 mandated reporters.

We provided individualized coaching, peer learning communities, directors' meetings, networking events, webinars and newsletters to more than 340 sites.

HOME VISITING

82 site visits were provided to HF and PAT program sites to support quality services for families.

37 training opportunities were provided to HF and PAT home visitors, supervisors, and managersWe welcomed 6 new PAT affiliates, with a total of 35 total regional affiliates including NJ.

We supported the launch of 5 new affiliates in Vermont to increase capacity and sustainability.

We offered **26** Communities of Practice sessions to share best practices among passionate stakeholders.

We joined national partners in advocating for increased funding for Maternal Infant Early Childhood Home Visiting, resulting in doubling of the federal investment for the next 5 years.

PARTNERSHIPS

PLP

We brought Old Navy's ONward program to PLP to support our sites & students with workshops and job opportunities. In fact, four students were offered flexible employment.

We partnered with Rutgers University School of Social Work Center for Research on Ending Violence to complete a Photovoice research project with PLP alumni, demonstrating that the program strengthened the 5 protective factors.

CONNECTIONS MATTER

We partnered with 36 organizations in NJ to deliver this program and joined a national network of 8 Connections Matter state partners.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

We co-hosted a Birth Equity event with Stockton University, Southern NJ Perinatal Cooperative, and Postpartum Support International NJ Chapter. 92 birthing and social service professionals attended and enjoyed presentations from March of Dimes, Chocolate Milk Café & Lactation Equity and more.

We co-hosted an event with Central Jersey Family Health Consortium: It Takes a Village – Supporting Early Parenting. Presentations included the Secret World of Perinatal Patients: Counseling Secrets to help them "speak the secret" by Hilary Waller of the Pospartum Stress Center and Transition to Fatherhood: Need and Experiences by Jim Doherty, RN.

YOUNG PARENT COALITION

We partnered with Rutgers University School of Social Work Center for Research on Ending Violence to evaluate the implementation of this new program to support young parents statewide.




